A SNAPSHOT OF MICHIGAN REDISTRICTING

WHERE WE ARE

On November 10th, Michigan's independent redistricting commissions voted to finalize potential maps. They are currently undergoing a 45-day public comment period before one last vote from the commission scheduled for Dec. 30.

Due to creation of the commission, experts suggest that elections will be much closer and that Republican's control over the state legislature will be in question. These commission maps address the compliant many have had, that certain voters have been packed into districts to dilute their power. The proposed districts are far less likely to see Democrats "packed" and have their voting power spread into neighboring, more Republican areas, in particular around metro Detroit, Grand Rapids and Lansing.

Overall, the redistricting panel is putting forward nine maps that the group drafted together and approved — three Congressional, three state House, and three state Senate's — and six maps recommended by individual commissioners.

The maps and information below draw from what is projected to the favorite map to be approved at each legislative level.

POLITICAL BREAKDOWN OF NEW MAPS

Congressional:

- 13 CDs, projected to be a 5D-4R with 4 toss-up seats (2 lean D & 2 lean R)

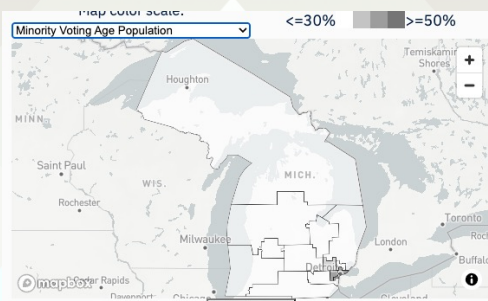
State Senate:

- 38 Districts, projected to be 20D-18R if voting patterns from recent elections continue.

State House:

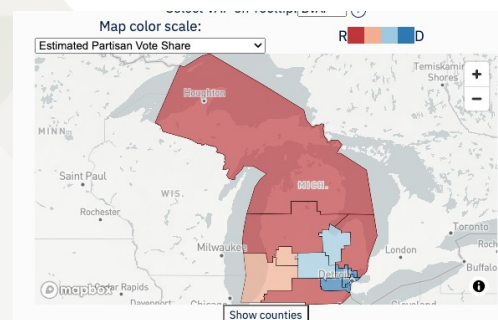
- 110 Districts, projected to be 56D-54R based on a recent election data
